Keep batteries out of your regular recycling bin. Household batteries are recycled separately from other items.
Mixing batteries in with other recyclables can result in a fire, as the battery can spark. You'll need to take your
batteries to a facility that collects batteries. Even a battery that has lost its charge can spark.
